PROPOSAL FOR ESTABLISHING A FORMAL FRAMEWORK FOR COOPERATIVE EFFORTS IN BELIZEAN EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

History/Background

In the mid-1980's, efforts within Belize to strengthen and expand capabilities in higher education led to a number of direct linkages between Belizean institutions and U.S. colleges and universities. These relationships, independently developed and variously funded, were established to address specific educational needs and goals, including faculty and staff development, institutional and program expansion, and curriculum development and improvement. By the late 1980's, it was apparent that coordination of such efforts was necessary to minimize duplication of efforts, to maximize the impact of available resources, and to address the needs of Belizean higher education in a systematic and effective fashion. Indeed, both U.S. and Belizean institutions found ad hoc cooperation and coordination essential in order to meet immediate project goals.

In conversations between Belizean officials and representatives of the various U.S. institutions involved in Belize, Belizean officials repeatedly mentioned the possibility of formalizing the cooperation that to some extent was already taking place. In the spring of 1988, Mr. Ernest Raymond, Principal of Belize Teachers' College, suggested that a consortium be formed to coordinate activities of Belizean and U.S. institutions involved in the development of higher education in Belize. As a result of Mr. Raymond's suggestion, representatives from two Belizean institutions and four U.S. institutions met at Murray State University in Murray, Kentucky, to discuss the formation of such a consortium. A representative of a fifth U.S. institution, unable to

attend the meeting, expressed strong interest in the proposed organization. A list of these institutions, along with the representatives of each that attended the meeting, is attached as Appendix A.

Out of discussions at the July 1988 meeting, a proposed design for a coordinating organization was developed. This proposal follows.

A Consortium for Belize/U.S. Educational Cooperation

A. Introduction

Recognizing the value of international educational interchange and the benefits of collaborative efforts, the member institutions and organizations commit themselves to the cooperative development of educational programs and activities in Belize.

B. Aims

The central aim of the consortium is to expand the impact of educational ventures undertaken to address identified needs in Belize and to enhance the international dimension of the U.S. member institutions. Activities of the consortium will be focused on:

- 1. Sharing knowledge and information relative to the development of higher education in Belize and to individual institutions' activities in Belize;
- Collaborating in research, teaching, curriculum development,
 and other appropriate scholarly and educational activities;
- 3. Developing mechanisms that will facilitate transfer of students;
- 4. Promoting faculty, staff, and student exchanges;
- 5. Supporting and encouraging staff and faculty development for both Belizean and U.S. member institutions;
- 6. Encouraging systematic and comprehensive planning of educational development efforts;
- 7. Assisting in acquisition of resources required to meet expressed needs of the higher education establishment in Belize.

C. Illustrative Programs

The consortium might undertake any of a variety of types of programs of mutual interest to Belizean and U.S. members and compatible with the organization's aims. Specific examples of appropriate activities include:

- Coordinated assistance in expanding and upgrading teacher education programs of the Ministry of Education, the Belize Teachers' College, and the University College of Belize;
- 2. Assistance in the development of degree-level programs in arts and sciences and in technical education.
- 3. Development of articulation agreements to ease the transfer of academic credits for students from Belizean institutions to member U.S. institutions;
- 4. Joint development of research programs on high priority topics, involving U.S. faculty and Belizean counterparts;
- 5. Collaborative curriculum development efforts;
- 6. Evaluation of program development and curriculum development activities;
- 7. Provision of faculty and staff resources through exchange and release-time arrangements to meet pressing and immediate staffing needs in Belize;
- Publication of a newsletter of information on developments and needs in Belizean higher education;
- 9. Cooperative support for the development of comprehensive and long-term educational planning;
- 10. Sponsorship of study abroad programs in Belize for students from U.S. member institutions;
- 11. Cooperative development of proposals to external funding agencies for projects addressing priority needs in Belize.

Development of policies encouraging publication in journals based on U.S. member campuses of appropriate scholarly articles by Belizean faculty, and similar policies encouraging publication in Belizean journals of appropriate scholarly articles by faculty from U.S. member institutions.

D. Structure of the Consortium

1. Membership

- a. <u>Eligibility</u>. Institutions and organizations in the following categories will be eligible for membership in the consortium:
 - i. Belizean institutions offering post-secondary educational programs;
 - ii. Belizean governmental and private organizations and agencies involved in higher education;
 - iii. U.S. organizations, agencies, and institutions with an active involvement in higher education in Belize.
- b. Procedures for joining. The president or chief executive official of institutions or organizations wishing to join the consortium shall submit a written request to the consortium; a two-thirds vote of the membership will be required to approve an application for membership.
- c. Annual dues. Membership fees shall be set by a two-thirds vote of the membership; initially, these dues will be US\$200 per annum for U.S. institutions and organizations and US\$50 for Belizean institutions and organizations.

2. Officers

- a. Officers of the consortium will include co-chairs (one Belizean and one U.S. representative) and a secretary.
- b. Officers will be elected by a two-thirds vote of the membership and will serve terms of two years. Officers may be re-elected for subsequent and consecutive terms.

3. Responsibilities of the Officers

- a. It will be the duty of the co-chairs to:
 - * preside over meetings and programs of the consortium;
 - * convene and prepare the agenda for consortium meetings;
 - * provide overall leadership for the consortium;
 - * assure that consortium communications and publications are prepared and distributed;
 - * authorize expenditures as approved by the consortium membership;
 - * report to the membership on the status of consortium funds;
 - * represent the consortium to outside organizations and agencies.
- b. It will be the duty of the secretary to:
 - * maintain minutes, records, and a directory of membership for the consortium;
 - * prepare and distribute consortium communications.

4. Meetings and Attendance

a. The consortium will meet a minimum of two times annually.

- b. At least one annual meeting will be held in Belize.
- c. Member institutions must commit funds for representatives to attend all meetings; institutions or organizations failing to be represented at two consecutive meetings will be dropped from membership.

Subject: Submission of B.S. Degree in Education Proposal

The enclosed propsal is presented for the review of the School of Education and Ferris State University.

Assumming that we can obtain approval for offering the program from FSU in a similar manner as for the business program, I believe we can be ready this fall term to accept students and begin classes. We now have over 50 applicants and more will come.

As you know, this is very important to the development of this new, only, national university of Belize. It takes the University College from being a business school multi-disciplinary institution, one step closer to becomming a complete university. The government of Belize has made a strong commitment to the University College. The governmental budget for UCB has been strong in providing funds for growth. We anticipate moving this summer into our new building located on 66 acres of UCB land overlooking the Caribbean Sea. The Prime Minister has agreed to address our first graduating class at formal ceremonies on May the 29th. Public support of the University College is becomming easier, partly as a result of the introduction of a weekly UCB radio program, and a fortnightly UCB news release. Also we have recently the inaugeration of "The Belizean: a Journal of Social announced Sciences." For national pride as well as for providing quality, appropriate, and economic educational opportunities, the growth and establishment of the University College of Belize is important.

The Education Program, as proposed, is made up almost entirely of courses and programs taken from the FSU curriculum. Any modifications or additions are indicated with an asterisk (*) in the proposal. Where we perceived the need for courses other than those found in the Catalog, or where the content of the courses have been significantly altered, the course descriptions have been included in the proposal. Other modifications are indicated below.

(1) An English major has been added due to the acute need for education in this area.

- (2) In English and Literature, several courses are proposed placing emphases on the Caribbean.
- (3) In History, courses have been added on history of Belize, the Caribbean, Latin America, Central America and Mexico.

The faculty requirements for offering the secondary education program with five majors and eight minors will require approximately 7 full-time-equivalent faculty members (See appended analysis: Teacher Education Requirements).

Three of the required faculty members include former faculty members that have returned, or will be returning for this fall term, after obtaining advanced degrees in the United States. Their curriculum vitae are included. Briefly they are:

- (1) Sylvana Woods, M.S. in Education from Indiana University, who returned in January and is coordinating the Education Program. Her interests and strengths are in Enlish, communications and education.
- (2) Angel Cal, Ph.D. expected in 1988 in History from the University of Arizona. He was a former faculty member (with BELCAST) and is returning in July of this year.
- (3) Ann Elrington, Ph.D. expected in 1988 in Chemistry from Emory University in Georgia, a former faculty member (with BELCAST) and is returning in September.

To provide the additional one and a half full-time-equivalent (FTE) for teaching in the Education courses we are planning on using several faculty members from Belize Teachers College in addition to faculty from Murray State (Sam Minner who has taught with us before) and North Florida University as confirmed by a recent visit by Drs. Betty Flincham and Joyce Jones. The teachers from Belize Teachers College we anticipate utilizing for particular courses include the following, all of which have Masters Degrees:

- (a) Ernest Raymond
- (b) Cynthia Thompson
- (c) Myrna Manzanares
- (c) Patricia Bennet
- (d) Judith Cayetano
- (e) Felecita Finney

In addition to Ms. Ann Elrington in the area of science and mathematics, we are anticipating the return to Belize Ms. Laureta Perriott who is receiving her Masters in Chemistry from Mankato State University, Missouri, Dr. Douglas James, Professor of Zoology at The University of Arkansas, is comming down this fall for one year to work with the science program as a Fulbright Scholar. We have allocated one additional faculty position for the area of mathematics and science that we would like to fill sometime this next year. We do have several potential sources.

An additional full-time-equivalent in English will be needed to support the education program in addition to our present faculty of Ms. Sylvanna Woods and Ms. Zee Edgell. Bolstering this area, Dr. Colville Young, with his doctorate in linguistics will be teaching especially in this area. Other assistance in this area is anticipated from Belize Teachers College particularly from Ms. Manzanares, and from Western Kentucky University (Mr. Robert Wurster). Also there are several viable candidates for the position here in Belize.

In other subject areas such as Business, we think we could use the extra students to bolster class enrollments.

We believe the proposal follows very closely to the programs offered at FSU and have resisted making a number of modifications that we would like to have made in the interest of obtaining a program that we can begin to offer this Fall term. Later we will want to make specific proposals for making modifications to the program, letting justification for such changes be based on the merits of each recommendation.

Finally, we are in need of obtaining someone in the School of Education that will serve as our contact in a similar manner as Mr. Otis Dickens in Business Administration, someone that can work with student transcripts from here and jwho is generally knowledgeable about the University College of Belize.

I leave this proposal in your hands because I know you will handle this with knowlegeable care and concern for the special relationship between Ferris State University and the University College of Belize.

BACHELOR OF SCIENCE DEGREE IN SECONDARY EDUCATION

The Education Program at the University College of Belize opens September 1988 with a B.Sc. degree in Secondary Education. Although the credit requirements stated for the various fields of the degree program reflect a four year schedule, at its inception, University College will only accept students who have already had at least two years of post secondary education. Hence, these students will enter the program as transfer students and, based on a transcript evaluation, be exempted from a number of courses.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Students must possess a 2.00 (C) grade point average on their transcripts and must possess one of the following:

- an Associate degree from a recognized institution
- a Diploma or Certificate from the Belize Teachers'
 College or other post-secondary institution.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Formally preclear for graduation.
- Complete a specified minimum number of credits in required and elected courses as approved by the faculty.
- 3. Attain a cumulative point average of 2.00 or above in all work taken while registered at the University.
- 4. Attain a minimum of 2.75 cumulative point average in a teaching major and minor.

REQUIREMENTS FOR DIRECTED AND/OR INTERNSHIP TEACHING

Directed Teaching or Internship Teaching is the period of guided teaching when the prospective teacher extends the teaching theory into the classroom for a period of 10 weeks (Directed Teaching)/20 weeks (Internship Teaching).

Transfer students from a teacher-training institution or with 3-5 years teaching experience need take only Directed Teaching. Those also needing Internship Teaching may complete this while actually on the job.

Special requirements for Directed or Internship Teaching include:

 Enrollment in the curriculum from which the student will graduate.

- 4. At least a 2.75 average in professional education courses.
- A cumulative grade point average of at least 2.0.
