

PROVIDING LIFE-LONG LEARNING OPPORTUNITES

Northeast Wisconsin Technical College is a twoyear technical college, serving Northeast Wisconsin by providing education, training, and life-long learning opportunities for individuals and businesses leading to the development of a skilled workforce. Our vision is to remain a cutting edge life-long learning college that transforms, strengthens, and inspires. Throughout 2014-2015 twenty-three students traveling in two separate cohorts embraced the opportunity to study abroad in Belize. The experiences were designed to enrich the student's cultural and diverse perspectives of Belize's early childhood educational system within the context of service-learning. Each student gained three practicum credits by working directly alongside educators within one of the Ministry of Educations' 36 preschool programs in the city of Corozal, Belize.

The students also had the opportunity to be fully immersed in the culture of Belize through their host families, most of which were educators within their host school as well. Six students travelling as part of the 2015 cohort participated in a unique service-learning experience benefitting Barney Preschool in Corozal, which is commonly known to be the most underserved preschool in the district. The students gave this one room school a makeover using classroom design and organization strategies, sanitized all toys and learning materials, and also donated learning tools and play items. Through our partnership with COBEC, NWTC is preparing another cohort of students to study abroad in Belize this upcoming January 2017.

UNIVERSITY OF NORTH FLORIDA, UNIVERSITY OF BELIZE AND MINISTRY OF EDUCATION INTERNATIONAL PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT SCHOOL CONTINUES TO MOVE FORWARD

As reported at our February 2016 COBEC meeting hosted by Independence Junior College in Placencia, the International Professional Development School collaborative initiative between the University of North Florida, the University of Belize and the Ministry of Education in Belize continues to make progress as fiscal year one comes to a close. On April 4, 2016 a second delegation of five Belizean educators representing the University of Belize, the Ministry of Education and KuxLin Ha Primary Government School will travel to Jacksonville, Florida where they will have the opportunity to observe firsthand, UNF's successful, award winning Urban Professional Development Schools and participate in workshops and training about Professional Development Schools. As second year funding begins in July 2016, UNF plans to explore the possibilities of establishing student exchanges with teacher education students from the University of Belize to be able to spend a brief three to four week internship experience in one of professional development schools in Jacksonville and to develop further the placement of UNF interns at KuxLin Ha Primary Government School in Belize.

This effort will continue to support the ongoing training in the areas of early literacy as well as addressing the special needs of teaching children with disabilities using the professional development school model. Drs. Susan Syverud, Deborah Reed, Cathy O'Farrell and John Kemppainen from UNF in collaboration with Drs. June Young, Catherine Wade, Maxine McKay, Cynthia Thompson and Nestor Chan from the University of Belize as well as Ms. Shirline Wiltshire, Aricelda Reed and Rosa Ramirez from KuxLin Ha and support from the Ministry of Education have worked diligently to bring this project to fruition. Phase two of this initiative will also include the use of technology which will allow for student teacher's supervisor to observe their students remotely with use of the Swivl Robot and an Ipad or other recording device. This will allow the supervisors to observe their student teachers in the classroom teaching while remaining in their offices or at a computer at a distant location by using Cloud technology. This has been a challenging but worthwhile initiative and the outcomes will benefit not only our student interns from both UNF and UB, but the children of Belize as well. More to come in future newsletters and at COBEC conferences.

COBEC EVALUATION STUDY UPDATE

During the July 2015 COBEC meeting in Wilmington, a group of COBEC members volunteered to conduct an assessment of the impact of COBEC on Belize and US Tertiary Education Institutions. The intent was to evaluate how successful it has been in achieving its goals and assessing ways in which participants and stakeholders have benefitted from COBEC's programs and activities. The assessment team includes the nine COBEC members whose names are listed below.

After receiving approval for the study from UNF's IRB, the team conducted eleven interviews that included both founding and long standing members. Historical documents stored at Valdosta State University, University of North Florida, and elsewhere are being classified and analyzed. We developed and disseminated a questionnaire online to all COBEC members (the questionnaire is accessible at this site: https://ufl. qualtrics.com/SE/?SID=SV_dcd8WtiYxvzNFnD. April, COBEC member institutions will be asked to provide information on the number of students who have attended COBEC institutions since 1990 and the number of students who have benefited from financial assistance through the efforts of COBEC individuals and institutions. COBEC institutions that would like to contribute to the study by identifying and sending the Team information may contact Deborah Davis (dsdavis@ valdosta.edu). During the second phase of the study, which begins in April, the Team will begin analyzing the interview data, collecting and analyzing survey data, and continue classifying and analyzing the COBEC's archival and historical documents.

The team will provide an update at the July meeting in Columbus. Special thanks to COBEC for support of the study, especially for providing funds for Dr. Flinchum's travel to conduct several of the interviews and for transcribing of the audio interviews.

The research team extends its deepest gratitude to all COBEC members for their contributions to the study, especially to those who have taken time to complete the online questionnaire and those who have taken time from their busy schedules to answer our interview questions. We trust the information from the study will contribute to COBEC's continual growth and development, which we hope will increase meaningful and rewarding academic opportunities for our students in Belize and the United States.
